Poet in the Spotlight: Edwina Trentham

“Poetry is basically my life. It gives me enormous joy to read and write poetry. I do not think I could survive without it,” says CPS member **Edwina Trentham**.

She began writing poetry as a youngster. “I used to write poems to my father, who kept them in an old copy of Dr. Zhivago, which I still have. At the Bermuda High School for Girls we read poetry all the time, and I learned to love poetry of all kinds.” Once she married, however, to a writer, she stopped writing her own pieces and concentrated on sending out her husband’s work. Later, after her divorce, she went to college, where she found her voice again. Some of her poetry was about her childhood in Bermuda, and although she had always considered herself to have had a happy childhood, she was startled to find that many of the poems were sad. Currently she is writing mostly politically-oriented poems. This is a reaction to the terrible events happening in the world.

Trentham was a featured reader at the Sunken Garden Poetry Festival and has given readings throughout Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New York. She is the founding editor of a national poetry journal, *Freshwater*. For 27 years she was a Professor of English at Asnuntuck Community College. She also taught courses in women’s poetry, memoir and political poetry as a visiting instructor at Wesleyan University.

The qualities Trentham values in poems, those of hers and those by others, are honesty, passion, rich imagery, and courage. Presently

she is reading *You Better Be Lightning* by Andrea Gibson and a chapbook by Jose Enrique Medina called *Haunt Me*. She also loves the work the work of Danusha Lameris; the poem “Small Kindnesses,” by Lameris is a favorite.

Trentham is a fulltime caretaker for her beloved husband. As well as caring for him, she enjoys sitting on the deck to watch birds, and she likes doing Tai Chi and going to the gym. She always looks forward to visiting with friends, most of whom are poets, so that they can talk about poetry.

This bilingual book received the 2025 Contemporary Poetry Award from the International Impact Book Awards, the Regal Summit Book Award, and an Honorable

Mention in the Poetry-Inspiration category from The Bookfest Book Award.

A longer version will be published shortly after in mass paperback and ebook formats by

Impspired Press. Later in the year, Impspired will also be publishing Pegi's novel-in-verse, *Uncharted: The Personal Voyage of Jeanne Baret, the First Woman to Circumnavigate the World*.

Ciaran Berry and **Debbie Gilbert** will read from their latest poetry collections on Saturday, January 10, 1 pm at the Barney Library, 71 Main Street, Farmington Village (not the main library). Berry's book is *States*, published by The Gallery Press, and Gilbert's book is *From the Altar of the Land*, published by Grayson Books. Ample parking in the library lot off Church Street.
